

THE DELUGE

With potentially millions of illegal aliens (or ‘migrants’ and ‘refugees’ in current politically correct parlance) beating down the gates of the rich European North, the Age of Chaos has crossed onto the Continent.

Years of spreading instability and war in Asia and Africa are now paying handsome dividends. The European “Union,” hesitant, undecided, divided, clumsy and, ultimately, prisoner of its own deliberately ignorant elites, is now beleaguered and convening more committees to decide how *to decide* about the “migrant crisis.”
