### Instructions for Authors:

- Manuscripts must be maximum 8,000 words and they will be accepted with the understanding that their content is unpublished and not submitted for publication elsewhere.
- All accepted manuscripts and artwork become the property of the publisher. Abstracts must be around 200 words.
- All manuscripts including title page, abstracts, tables, and legends, should be typewritten, double spaced.
- Font should be Times New Roman 12.
- All margins should be at least one inch and all pages should be numbered consecutively throughout the manuscript.
- Manuscripts must be submitted electronically in Microsoft Word.
- Titles must be as brief and clear as possible. On the title page include full names of authors, academic and/or other professional affiliations, email accounts and the complete mailing address for correspondence.

### **INTELLIGENCE COOPERATION: LOOKING AHEAD OF 2020s**

The topic of the June 2019 Volume of the *Journal of European and American Intelligence Studies (JEAIS)* is **“Intelligence Cooperation: Looking Ahead of 2020s”**. This issue aims to address the dynamics of intelligence interaction between both domestic and international agencies and organizations, among military, civilian and hybrid structures, within the Government and the Private Sector, from a wide range of perspectives.

The Editors invite contributors to research on the various ways cooperative relations are established between Governments, within the same national Intelligence Community, between the public and the private sectors of intelligence, as well as among different industries developing intelligence capabilities. The intelligence field is going through a period of transformations that will profoundly change the theory and practice of intelligence. As part of this becoming, the area of intelligence cooperation will know significant changes that will affect the *why*, *how*, and *when* actors decide to share secrets. Ahead of 2020, the “need to share” will not just continue to complement the “need to know,” but it will also evolve towards a need to integrate resources and create joint tools and means for increased security ends.

This volume aims at studying cooperation opportunities in the *New Age of Intelligence* across the broader intelligence tradecraft and the extended Intelligence Community. The topics of interest to be inspected in this issue of the JEAIS include, but are not limited to:

- Mechanisms of information liaison;
- Current challenges of intelligence sharing (within the public and the private sectors);
- Key infrastructure in intelligence cooperation;
- Old and new approached to information sharing;
- Democratic control and accountability of information sharing by public and private entities;
- The role of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in intelligence cooperation;
- Theories of intelligence cooperation;


- All references should be numbered consecutively as footnotes at the end of each page.
- In the text, references should be cited by a superior character of the corresponding number. For further information, consult *The Chicago Manual of Style*, 14th edition.
- All articles undergo a rigorous double-blind peer review process.

- Cooperative competition and competitive cooperation in international intelligence;
- Emerging actors in intelligence cooperation;
- The politicization of intelligence cooperation.

The editors look forward to receiving theoretical and empirical papers, syntheses, expert opinions and book reviews in relation to the field of intelligence cooperation. On this account, perspectives from both scholars and practitioners that address applied and theoretical issues are expected to provide significant approaches on present and future trends.
